Public Safety and Street Improvements Drive the 2025 Budget

The proposed 2025 Budget prominently features a significant number of public safety and infrastructure improvements, while also introducing several other noteworthy new community service initiatives.

The 2025 Budget faced unprecedented challenges due to a historic number of unfunded State mandates. A significant increase in funding has been allocated for the recruitment and retention of Police Officers and Firefighters, which continue to be a top priority for the City Council. The focus on public safety initiatives requires continued compensation and benefit modifications to maintain a competitive balance in a challenging employment market. The Fire Protection Budget also reflects a 16% increase in the City's contribution to the Anoka-Champlin Fire Department, driven by an increase in Paid On-Call firefighter hours and the addition of a full-time firefighter position, designed to enhance response times during peak service demands.

In addition to the focus on public safety, the 2025 Operating Budget encompasses a wide array of new City service initiatives. Notable funding allocations include addressing the increasing demand for recreational facility and programming services on the riverfront, in addition to implementing a Hennepin County required Organics Recycling Program. The budget also includes provisions to meet State and Federal environmental mandates, including compliance for the City's MS4 stormwater requirements, erosion control, and sustainability initiative regulations.

In 2025, nearly half (48%) of the City's total budgeted spending will focus on Capital Improvement Projects. The City Council remains dedicated to addressing our aging street infrastructure, with approximately 75% of capital expenditures earmarked for neighborhood street rehabilitation. Funding sources for these projects include special assessments, Municipal State Aid, and when possible, grants from County, State, and Federal programs. Notably in 2025/2026, the 109th Avenue project, a collaborative effort with the City of Brooklyn Park, is fully funded through a \$10 million bonding allocation from the State of Minnesota, along with contributions from Hennepin County and Municipal State Aid Funds, which means it will require minimal funding from Champlin property taxpayers.

Winter Fire Prevention Tips



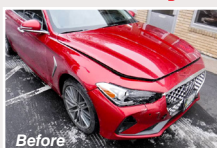
From your Anoka-Champlin Fire Department



- Clearing snow within a 3-foot perimeter of hydrants can save lives. When firefighters arrive on scene, they waste crucial time if digging out a hydrant. Remember to shovel a pathway to the street as well!
- Due to the high cost of heating, many are seeking alternative ways to stay warm. However, wood-burning fireplaces and space heaters contribute to residential fires. If using them, never leave them unattended.
- Many of us gather in the kitchen during this time of year. Careless use of the range or stovetop is the leading cause of home fires, so it's essential to always have someone watching the stove!
- Holiday decorating can brighten our winter days and long nights. Unfortunately, decorations can pose significant hazards if not used carefully. An estimated 250 home fires involve Christmas trees, and another 170 involve holiday lights or other decorative lighting, so use caution and check them often.
- Lastly, check your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. If they are older than 10 years, it's time to replace them. The ACFD partners with the American Red Cross to provide residents with free battery-operated smoke alarms and free radon testing kits.

For 2025, the City's gross levy is projected to increase by approximately 8.5%. After accounting for increases in Fiscal Disparities, the net levy is expected to rise by 7%. While these figures are still preliminary, homeowners in Champlin with a median property value of \$354,700, can anticipate an approximate increase of \$85 to the City share of their annual property tax statement.

Staff and City Council discussions regarding the 2025 Budget commenced in early June and continued throughout the summer and fall. On September 23rd, the City Council certified both the proposed 2025 General Fund Operating Budget, and the annual property tax levy to Hennepin County. Earlier this month, you should have received your Notice of Proposed Property Tax Statement from Hennepin County, which estimates your property taxes payable in 2025. It is important to note that your local Champlin share of your property taxes represent only approximately one-third of your total property tax payment; Hennepin County and the Anoka-Hennepin School District account for the remaining balance.

In light of the continued uncertainties associated with the economy and the unknowns involving the recently elected State and Federal legislative bodies, take comfort in the fact that the City Council is committed to upholding our public safety initiatives and rehabilitating our City street infrastructure, while ensuring the delivery of the essential and reliable City services that residents have come to expect in Champlin.

If you have the opportunity, I encourage you to take time to participate in the Public Informational Meeting scheduled for Monday, December 9th, where you will have the opportunity to bring forward any comments and/or concerns regarding the proposed 2025 General Fund Operating Budget. 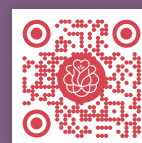

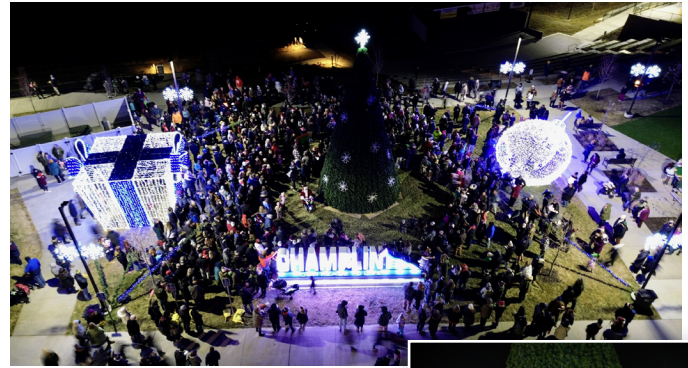

Salt Wisely

It only takes one teaspoon of salt to pollute five gallons of water permanently. The Champlin Environmental Resources Commission (ERC) encourages property owners to follow these tips for using salt wisely this winter.

1. Shovel

Clear walkways before snow turns to ice, and before you apply salt. The more snow you clear manually, the less salt you'll need.

2. Select

Salt doesn't melt ice if the pavement is below 15 degrees, so use sand for traction when it's too cold, or choose a different deicer.

3. Scatter

Use salt only when it is critical. When you apply salt to pavement, leave plenty of space between granules. A 12-ounce coffee cup of salt is enough to cover 10 sidewalk squares or a 20-foot driveway.

4. Sweep

Cleanup leftover salt, sand, and deicer to save and reuse as needed.



Snowplowing Program

To avoid plowing twice, Public Works plows after the snowfall ceases. Starting between the hours of 2 a.m. and 4 a.m., snow is plowed within 24 hours. It requires approximately 10 hours to plow all streets. Arterial routes are plowed first to have an "early-plow" route within a quarter mile of each residence. We encourage residents to stake curbs to protect yards and keep carts, cars, and kids off the street. If you experience an emergency and your street has not been plowed, call Hennepin County Dispatch at 612-596-0299 or 911. HC is also your go-to for county roads. For state highways, contact MNDOT at 651-234-7110. For city streets, call Public Works at 763-421-2820 or after hours at 952-258-5321.

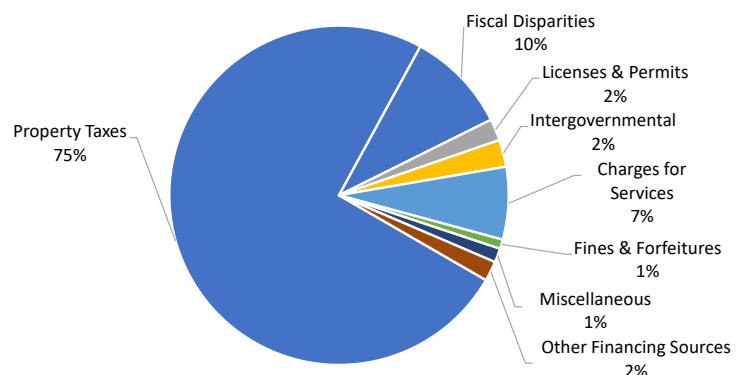

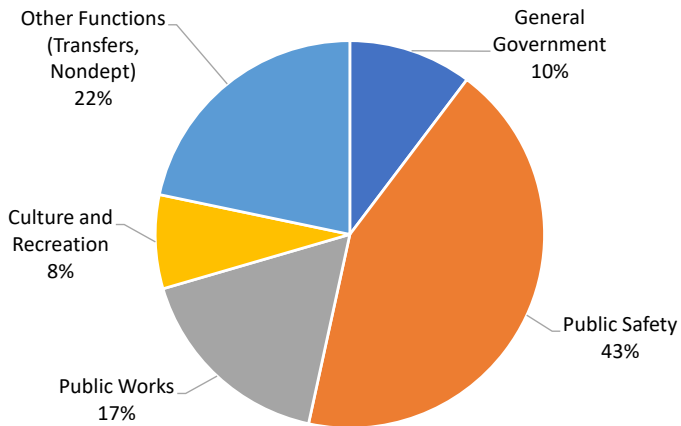
CITY OF CHAMPLIN 2025 BUDGET

A **GENERAL FUND** is the primary fund used by the City of Champlin. This fund is used to record all resource inflows and outflows that are not associated with special-purpose funds (like water and sewer utilities). The activities being paid for through the general fund consist of core administrative and operational tasks the City performs for its taxpayers. Its primary inflow is the annual property tax levy.

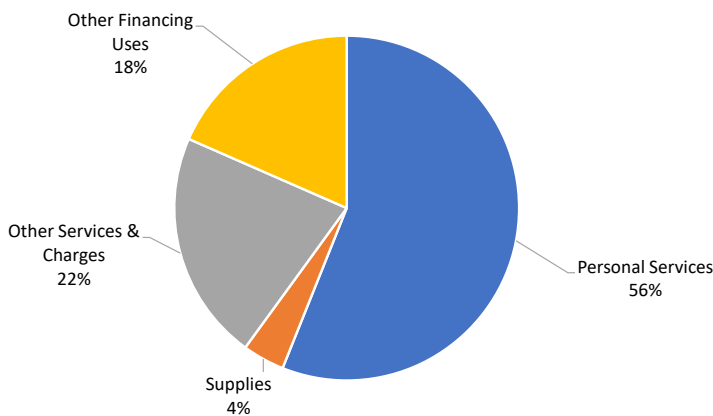
2025 General Fund Revenues



2025 General Fund Expenditures by Department



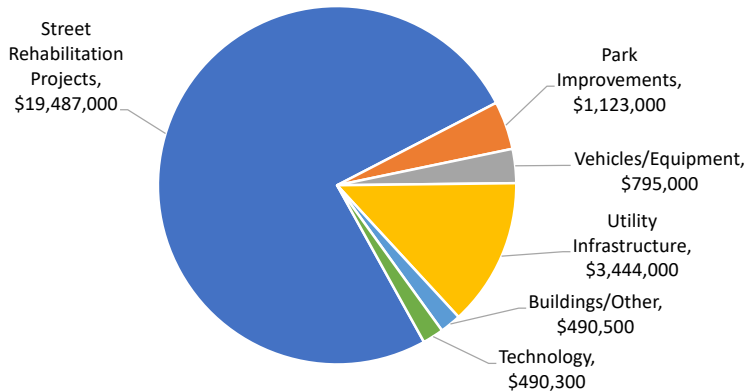
2025 General Fund Expenditures by Category
